Business

The meeting format was altered this evening to focus on final preparations for Field Day, just 16 days away. Control of the meeting was turned over to Scott, W2NTV. Scott reminded everyone that set-up will begin at 2:00 p.m. on Friday, June 22. Location is Pavilion Four at Bowdoin Park, the same as last year. It was understood that not everyone will be able to join the effort at this time and day but our goal, nonetheless, is to have all the antennas and radios set up and tested by Friday night.

Adam has requested that all the antennas be hung prior to his arrival later on Friday. This should not be a problem. This year we will only use wire antennas for HF and this should greatly simplify and shorten our set-up time.

Scott reminded those that are unfamiliar with the ICOM and Kenwood radios that the time to learn – or brush up – on the equipment, operating techniques and menus is on Friday evening and/or Saturday morning before Field Day commences at 2:00 p.m. EDT. Those taking advantage of this opportunity are reminded that the callsign K2QS cannot be used until Field Day's commencement; they must use their own callsigns or the callsign of a nearby, willing control operator if their license class does permit the HF operation they wish to perform. Once Field Day begins there will be enough Extra Class operators to act as control operators so Field Day can be fully enjoyed by hams of any license class as well as non-hams who want to give it a try. Scott reminded all that the Field Day is exchange is simply, "K2QS 3A ENY" on CW/digital and "K2QS 3 Alpha Eastern New York" on SSB. We will again operate three HF stations plus one GOTA station as well as VHF. All antennas will be wire, except for VHF, and will include dipoles, a 40 meter Delta Loop, and a "mystery antenna" provided by JB, WA2WMJ. Paul, W2AKT will provide a generator. Keith, KD2AOF, and Scott will attend to these details.

Dell, W2DX had accepted responsibility to manage the networking of the logging computers but informed Scott, the Field Day Coordinator, on May 30th that he would "not be attending Field Day in any form". Nick, N2QZ is unavailable this year.

Jim, AC2EU, immediately put out the call for a new "computer guru" to take the lead role for the networking. Keith, KD2AOF, answered and has agreed to take the managing role.

Brian, W2BJF, will be bringing three pre-configured County laptops on loan for the Event. Jim, AC2EU, will be updating the software on the QSY owned computers.

The backup plan is simply to log via un-networked laptops at each operating position. While we won't enjoy cross-communication for dupe checking or band management, it will not affect our

ability or enjoyment of Field Day. However, we fully expect the network to be up and running, but is always good to have a plan B!

Following Scott's Field Day segment, Alice Castellano, W2ALI sold 50/50 tickets while everyone took a short break.

Paul, WA2JTX won the 50/50 raffle. The raffle total take was \$64; \$32 went to Paul and \$32 went to the QSY treasury. In addition, \$20 from the swap meet of the May meeting was deposited to the QSY treasury.

Roundtable

The meeting then continued with an abbreviated Roundtable (our favorite part!).

- Jim, AC2EU kicked it off by showing a neat mic he built for his new FT-817. He built an adapter to allow the popular and readily available electret mic to be used as a dynamic mic. Jim offered the plans to anyone who would like them.
- Scott, W2NTV said he'd already talked himself out and passed the baton to Stan.
- Stan, WB2LQF, reported that he had enjoyed the previous weekend's Museum Ships Weekend operating event in spite of heavy contesting which competed for the frequencies advertised for the special event. There were 92 museum ships participating around the world and contacting any 15 would qualify for an attractive certificate. Stan only managed to get seven ships but two of them were long-desired goals – the USS Hornet in Alameda, CA and the USS Turner-Joy in Bremerton, WA. The Hornet was the prime recovery ship for Apollo 11 and the Turner-Joy was involved in the 1964 Tonkin Gulf "incident" which essentially started the Vietnam War.
- Mike, KC2HEI reported that he reconfigured his G5RV with the assistance of Bob, WA2JQK and he is now on 160 meters with it and it seems to work fine.
- JB, WA2WMJ said he's been contacting SSB stations using CW and urged others to make this technique a part of their own operating style as appropriate. For example, if a foreign station is operating SSB in a portion of the band where their country allows phone but the U.S. does not, give it a shot! Besides "playing with CW", JB has been working on antennas, including a "mystery antenna" he'll be bringing to Field Day. He also has been spending time helping others to learn about and enjoy ham radio; a favorite part of our hobby for JB.
- Bob, WA2JQK was busy at Lyme Rock with his other hobby – auto racing – during the recent WPX contest. Nonetheless, he got on the air when he returned home and made a few contacts even though he was dead tired. Bob later was able to determine that he
